Arise & Shine 2026: Our Shared Journey to Purpose

As we look toward 2026, Methodist Women in Britain stands at a unique crossroads. We are a movement defined by the incredible diversity of our gifts and the shared strength of our faith. Together, we are launching our **2026 National Plan**, rooted in the call of **Isaiah 60:1–5** to "*Arise and Shine.*" This is more than a theme; it is a roadmap we have built together to ensure our spiritual depth is directly connected to our community service.

Where Our Power Meets Our Purpose

Our movement is at its strongest when we work in harmony. This year, we are embarking on a three-stage journey that invites every member, in every District, to play a vital role:

- **Awakening (March):** We begin in our local groups, studying together to identify the unique "Power" and gifts God has placed within our community.
- **Activation (April):** Our Residential Swanwick Conference, "***Where Power meets Purpose: Small Acts that Change the World***" will be our national gathering theme. Here, we will combine our collective energy to identify the "Small Acts" that will change the world.
- **Action (May–Dec):** We return to our pews and our streets to "Shine. Through a new **National Tracker**, we will finally quantify and celebrate the immense impact of Methodist women across Britain.

**Pilgrimage of the Soul –
Meeting God in the Wilderness, Mountaintop, and Waterside
Lancashire MWiB Conference at the Glendower Hotel**

It was a privilege to be asked to lead the Conference this year as the Lancashire Methodist Women in Britain (MWiB) gathered once again in the beautiful coastal town of St Annes by the Sea nestled within the wider county of Lancashire. Hosted at the welcoming Glendower Hotel, the conference brought together women from across the region for what I hoped would be a deeply reflective and spiritually nourishing weekend centred on “Pilgrimage of the Soul: Meeting God in the Wilderness, Mountaintop, and Waterside.” This was an invitation to journey inward.

A Sacred Theme for a Sacred Time

The theme invited us to explore three profound spiritual landscapes: the wilderness, the mountaintop, and the waterside. Each has long been a biblical symbol of encounter, challenge, and renewal. Over the weekend, these landscapes framed worship, reflection, storytelling, and shared prayer.

Meeting God in the Wilderness

The wilderness is never comfortable—yet it is often where transformation begins. In Scripture, the wilderness is: A place of testing; a place of clarity; a place where distractions fall away; a place where God speaks in surprising ways. During the conference, we reflected on our own wilderness experiences—periods of uncertainty, loss, transition, or waiting. Through guided devotions and shared testimony, we were reminded that God does His deepest work in desolate places. The wilderness doesn't mean God is absent; rather, it's often where he becomes most real.

Meeting God on the Mountaintop

Mountaintop moments are those precious, awe-filled experiences when God feels close and unmistakably present.

Like Moses on Sinai or the disciples at the Transfiguration, mountaintop encounters: Renew our strength; deepen our faith; give us perspective and remind us of God's majesty.

Meeting God at the Waterside

Just steps away from the seafront, the conference's location offered the perfect backdrop for contemplating the waterside.

The waterside is a symbol of: refreshment; restoration; new beginnings and the washing away of fear and heaviness.

Many attendees enjoyed quiet walks along the promenade, listening to the rhythm of the waves—reminders of God's constancy and peace. Devotional times encouraged us to imagine Jesus by the Sea of Galilee, calling disciples, performing miracles, and offering breakfast on the beach to weary friends.

Here, in the gentle hush of sea and sky, the soul finds rest.

Our final session was to go on a pilgrimage using the image of the Labyrinth from Reims Cathedral. We packed our small bags with items we needed on the way.

We shared in: 3 guided meditations;

Reflected on how God moulds us?

Listening to the heart of God;

Who is journeying with us?

Where do we go for spiritual first aid?

What does our faith cost us

Wrote a letter to ourselves which I will post over the next few months

Fellowship, Food, and the Gift of Community

No MWiB event would be complete without rich fellowship. Conversations flowed over meals, laughter filled the lounges, and new friendships blossomed. The Glendower Hotel provided a warm and hospitable atmosphere, allowing women to relax, reflect, and enjoy being together. Workshops and sessions created space not only for spiritual exploration but also for creativity, discussion, and mutual encouragement. As always, the sense of community was one of the greatest blessings of the weekend.

Leaving Renewed, Strengthened, and Sent

By the end of the conference, hopefully everyone left with:

- New insights
- Renewed hope
- Strength for the journey ahead

A deeper awareness of God's presence in all seasons of life

The pilgrimage of the soul continues long after the suitcases are packed.

Whether we find ourselves in wilderness, on a mountaintop, or by quiet waters, the message of the weekend remains:

God is already there—waiting to meet us.

Hello everyone!

I'm really excited to be joining the Helen Kim Memorial Scholarship programme and to be introduced to the MWiB community.

I first found my way into Methodism during my studies at Cambridge, where I encountered a church community that was incredibly welcoming, happy to answer my many questions, and displayed a strong commitment to justice. Through this, my faith developed. I felt drawn to become more involved in the life of the Church. Over the past few years, I've gradually grown in confidence and in my sense of how I might be able to contribute.

I am an active member of Castle Street Methodist Church in Cambridge, where I serve as Church Secretary. I also take part in *Table Talk*, our student and young adults' group, which allows me a chance to share fellowship, conversation, and faith exploration.

I also sit on the Church's AI Working Group. My MSc dissertation in Data and AI Ethics was completed in partnership with the Methodist Church, and our findings will be presented at the 2026 Conference. I also really valued attending 3Generate, where I shared my research through a textile artefact designed for public engagement. Outside of church life, I work at the University, coordinating and delivering VR-based therapy sessions for students experiencing speech anxiety. This has deepened my interest in how technology can be used with care and compassion.

I have a particular interest in women's dignity, inclusion, and justice. Much of my research has explored how emerging technologies can unintentionally reinforce gendered harms or exclude women's voices, and I try to bring this learning thoughtfully into church and community settings. Through the Helen Kim Leadership Training Programme, I'm looking forward to learning from women across the global Methodist family, deepening my discipleship, and bringing that learning back into church life here.

In my free time, I enjoy reading, board games, baking, embroidery and cross-stitch, general crafting, and cycling.


**Vice President WFMUCW Britain & Ireland

Methodist Women in Britain Empowerment Gifts—Empowering Women abroad

Each year Methodist Women in Britain Trustees meet in October to consider the applications for an Empowerment Gift.

The following are the groups that have been awarded an Empowerment Gift in 2025.

Tanzania Methodist Church – to raise awareness, train and empower local women and their communities on the importance of women’s rights and gender justice issues and to help with projects to financial independence. - £3,000

All We Can – a project in the Busoga region of Uganda for training in child protection and reproductive health - £2,000

CONECE in Uganda – to support awareness, advocacy and skills training for disabled women and teenage mothers - £2,000

COFCawe in Uganda – to provide skills development to encourage self employment and supporting local communities - £3,000

EHCO - Wakiso in Uganda – to empower rural women to make re-usable sanitary pad production and basic business skills. - £2,000

Mzinyathi women in Zimbabwe – to establish a market garden to help widows and single mothers and to provide safe water for the primary school - £2,000

We will hear more of the work of these projects later in the year, but it is good to know that these Gifts will make a difference to some very vulnerable groups.

News from Methodist Women in Ireland

Methodist Women in Ireland ALL IRELAND G.I.G.G.L.E.S. Conference Filling Thomas Street, Portadown with “Joy in the Journey”

An atmosphere of warmth, laughter and fellowship marked the All Ireland G.I.G.G.L.E.S. Conference as over 105 ladies, children and Methodist Women in Ireland (MWI) volunteers gathered for a day centred on faith, friendship and fun.

G.I.G.G.L.E.S. — Girls In God, Growing, Learning, Eating & Sharing — truly reflected its name from the moment attendees arrived. Guests were welcomed with tea, coffee, and fresh fruit cups topped with granola and Greek yoghurt along with a selection of delicious pastries and gluten free options.

Ladies were officially welcomed to the morning by All Ireland President, Alexa Brown, who warmly encouraged everyone to embrace the spirit of the day and “have a go at everything.” Following an outline of the programme, excitement quickly filled the venue as participants made their way to a wide variety of creative and uplifting workshops.



Sessions throughout the day included Jewellery Making, Clayful Minds, Gym workout, Bible Journaling, Finding Calm, Sing a New Song, Beauty Inside and Out, The Power of Puppetry, and No Bake Bakes. Each workshop provided opportunities to learn new skills, deepen faith, nurture wellbeing, and build lasting friendships across generations.

Powerful connections took place during makeup demonstrations and encouragement was found as the ladies gathered for workshops. Creating in Clayful Minds saw new friendships established and joy was found in the simple blessing of singing together. Finding Calm was a deeply moving workshop with shared experiences of Cancer diagnoses helped to focus ladies on their own wellbeing together. The No Bake Bake workshop was full of laughs and Maeve and Heidi can now make protein balls in their sleep! The jewellery makers were delighted with their Biblical Bracelets and Bible Journaling inspired ladies of all ages to put pen to paper to create masterpieces for sharing the gospel. The workout session appeared innocuous enough, but by the end of the day, some ladies were aware that they had absolutely, 'worked out!'



Puppetry was new to us all and Branden was an excellent advocate for his craft and for how simply a puppet can hold attention and share the Good News of the Gospel.



G.I.G.G.L.E.S. has previously featured in Enniskillen Methodist Church, at a local level. However, this is the first All Ireland event of the same name. The conference theme, "Joy in the Journey," was evident in every aspect of the day — from the stories shared and

the encouragement offered, to the friendships formed and the unmistakable sound of giggles filling the air. The conference concluded with everyone gathering at Thomas Street Methodist Church, for a special time of worship together. Voices lifted in praise as attendees sang the new songs learned during the "Sing a New Song" workshop. Branden Treu delighted all present with his engaging puppetry, bringing both laughter and reflection. Moving testimonies were shared by ladies who had taken part in the day's activities, highlighting the impact of fellowship and faith. The congregation also discovered that Methodist Church in Ireland President, Rev Alan Wardlow, has a gift for humour — sharing a few jokes that added even more smiles to an already joy-filled day.

The dedication and hard work of the MWI volunteers ensured the conference ran seamlessly and that every attendee felt welcomed and valued. A Life in Fellowship - My Story/ My Song - A New Exhibition at Epworth Old Rectory - GET INVOLVED

Have you a story to tell about your life, or that of another woman in your life, related to belonging to a global fellowship group? We are looking to celebrate our language-diverse groups and congregations in a brand new exhibition being developed at the Old Rectory over the forthcoming year; delving into our unique Women's collection of objects and archives and adding to our displays using content created from personal reflections as well as physical items that show how our Global Fellowships brings our diverse cultures and distinct spirituality together.

Epworth Old Rectory, as the home of Susanna Wesley, is ideally placed to help share these stories and we would love you to become part of this narrative.

Sarah is also working with Rev Inderjit Bhogal on the development of a new Pilgrimage route called The Equiano Way. The route is named after one man, Olaudah Equiano (Gustavas Vassa), born a prince in Nigeria, enslaved and bought and sold in the Trans-Atlantic Slave Trade, escaped his bondage, bought his own freedom, wrote his story and walked and worked around Britain and many parts of the world as a well-known campaigner for the abolition of slavery.

The places Olaudah visited included Hull. He went to Sheffield, in August 1790, a visit arranged by the Rev Thomas Bryant, a local Methodist Minister. In Sheffield Olaudah had the support of radicals like James Montgomery, and Mary Ann Rawson's family. Mary Ann Rawson attended the inaugural World Anti-Slavery Convention in London (1840), and went on to form the Sheffield Ladies Association for the Universal Abolition of Slavery.

John Wesley was reading Olaudah's book in his final days, and refers to the book in a letter to William Wilberforce written on 24 February 1791, aged 88, six days before he died, urging Wilberforce to sustain his anti-slavery campaign.

The Equiano Way follows some of Olaudah's route. It is a Pilgrimage trail that travels 80 miles from Wincobank in Sheffield to Wilberforce House in Hull, via towns and villages in South Yorkshire, North Lincolnshire and Humberside, including Epworth and tells the important stories of these places. The route is planned to launch in early June 2026.

Remembering Margaret Law (1960–2026)

It was with shock and great sadness that many of us within the Methodist Church in Scotland learned of the sudden death of our friend, Margaret Law, at the beginning of the year. Even now, it is hard to believe that she is no longer with us.



Margaret was heavily involved with Women's Network (more recently known as MWiB) in Armadale Methodist Church, along with her mum, Ida Drummond, and it was at circuit Network events during the late 1990s that I got to know Margaret well. We connected straight away as we were the same age.

Margaret was a Methodist local preacher, steward, and organist at her church in Armadale, as well as being involved in the life of the church and community. She was an 'ideas' person and could always come up with a suggestion when needed for our many Methodist Women in Scotland gatherings and she threw herself wholeheartedly into whatever she volunteered to do. She was often seen at the annual MWiB Swanwick conference over the years.

Margaret lit up a room with her ready smile and gentle nature and was well known for her wonderful sense of humour and fun and the ability to look on the bright side of life. She always had a story to tell and, while making others laugh, she didn't mind laughing at herself as well. As someone said to me recently, Margaret was the life and soul of our times together and memories of those times will stay with us always.

We remember Margaret's husband, two sons, and wider family at this time and hold them in prayer during these difficult days.

I could share many more memories of Margaret, however, for now, this dear friend of mine, and many others, leaves a legacy of faithfulness, gentleness, kindness, generosity, love and joy, and a warmth and strength of character that ensures she will be remembered fondly by all who knew her.
